## The Obituary

Beverly W. Jones, Ph.D., was born in Durham, North Carolina on December 13, 1947 and departed her life on July 19, 2020 at 12 noon.

Dr. Jones was a native of Durham, North Carolina and a graduate of the Durham Public School system. She received both her Bachelor of Arts (1970) and Master of Arts (1972) Degrees in History from North Carolina Central University, and was the first African American female to receive a Ph.D. in American History from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill (1980).

Dr. Jones was a trailblazer as a historian, author, and educator who was inspired and encouraged by the actions and passions of her time. She rose through the academic ranks at North Carolina Central University as an Assistant Professor to Full Professor and served in several administrative positions, to include Provost and Vice Chancellor and Interim Chancellor of North Carolina Central University.

Dr. Jones was an elected official who served with distinction as a member and Chair of the Durham City Schools Board of Education. After the merger of the Durham City School System, she was elected to the Durham Public Schools Board of Education, where she served for seven years. In 1998, she chose not to run for reelection and accepted the position of Dean of the University College at NCCU.

She served as Chair of Durham's Committee on Racial Understanding and organized three Town Hall Meetings in cooperation with Chancellor Julius L. Chambers, Dr. John Hope Franklin, and Duke President Nan Keohane.

Dr. Jones is survived by her loving and devoted husband of 50 years, Clarence Ray Jones, who was her tireless caregiver for the last seasons of her life; son Garry Jones, daughters Michelle Jones (Wyatt) and Ingrid Whitaker (Michael); grandchildren Amir, Ariana, and Jeremiah; one sister Betsy Bailey (George) in Philadelphia, PA, one brother Donald Washington in Durham, NC and three godchildren Monica Davenport in Durham, NC, Victor Morrison Jr. in Los Angeles, CA and Angela Washington (niece) in Baltimore, MD as well as several other nieces, nephews, cousins and friends.


