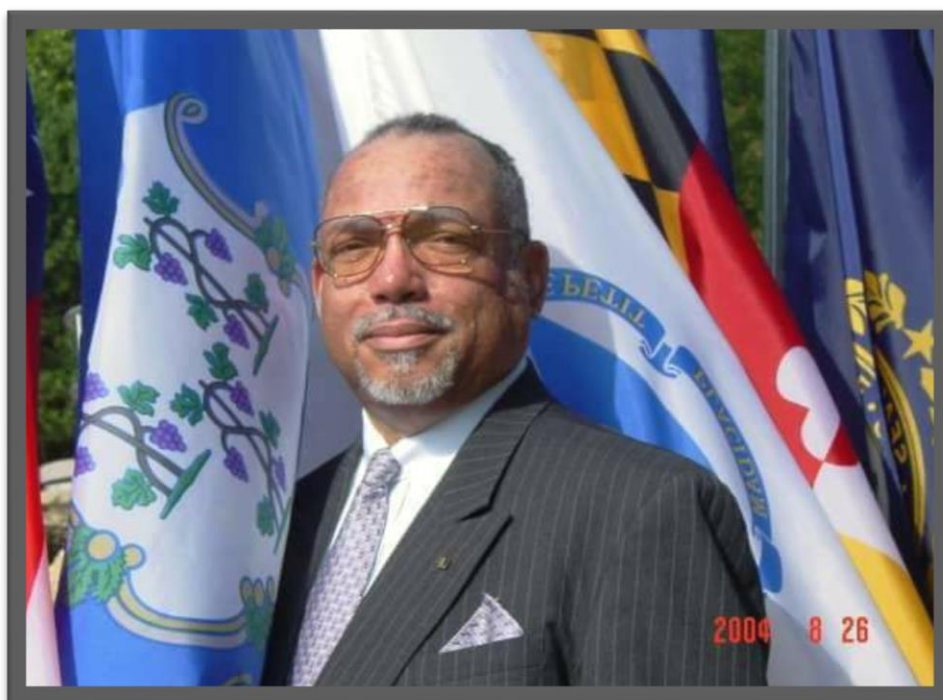

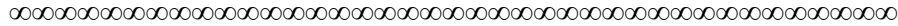

Deacon Andrew Donald Malloy
(Former Captain – United States Army)

“A Man for All Seasons”

Hero... humanitarian... philanthropist... mentor... brother... servant leader... friend. Andrew “Donald” Malloy passed away Saturday, February 18, 2017 surrounded by close family, friends, love, and prayer at the Inova Fairfax Hospital in Falls Church, Virginia. From humble beginnings in Durham, North Carolina travel, war, education, and becoming a keen observer of people and life broadened Donald’s scope and world view. Over the course of his life, he became a “Man for All Seasons.” Born on August 20, 1947 to loving, young parents, Lida Dickerson and James Elisha (deceased) Malloy, Andrew was the eldest of seven children, four of whom, along with his mother, are alive to mourn and rejoice his passing. Early education was in Durham City Schools at C.C. Spaulding Elementary and J.A. Whitted Junior High. Leadership abilities and a pioneering spirit surfaced in young Andrew as a member of Mt. Zion Baptist Church and Barbee’s Chapel Missionary Baptist Church, the Cub and Boy Scouts, and as captain of the Safety Patrol at Hillside High School. He achieved the prestigious rank of Eagle Scout during those years. He enjoyed the Baptist Training Union at Mt. Zion and still recited scriptures he learned there. He had a solid Christian foundation, made stronger when he accepted Christ as his Savior. He also told one of his sisters that he recommitted his life to Christ in a foxhole in Viet Nam as he recited the 23rd Psalm. He jokingly recounted that, “You find the Lord real fast when bullets are flying. He heard my prayer.” His maternal grandparents, Flora Juanita and Landon J. Dickerson, Sr., helped rear and nurture him.

A lifelong learner and history buff, Andrew majored in History at what is now North Carolina Central University in Durham, until he volunteered for the United States Army. Again, he excelled. During his Army tenure, he achieved exemplary ratings in Officers Candidate School at Fort Benning, Georgia, and was later promoted to the rank of Captain. During the Vietnamese War he was a 1st Lieutenant with the 25th Military Police Company, 25th Infantry. He displayed uncommon valor, saving the lives of troops under his command and engaging enemy attacks. In one episode, he saved his platoon from ambush and certain death by removing a disabled Humvee allowing troops to pass, although he was severely wounded himself. He received six Bronze stars: two for meritorious achievement, one for meritorious service and three for valorous and heroic actions. He received five Purple Hearts, and innumerable meritorious service commendations and awards during his fifteen year military career.

Donald was a long-term “military man”, having served his country on foreign and domestic soil in various capacities since the age of 20. Most recently, he was Branch Chief/ADR Officer for the Equal Employment Opportunity Branch of the Office of Civil Rights for the United States Department of Agriculture. Prior to this position he had many years of service at The Pentagon, the Secret Service, and Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, all in Washington, DC.

Andrew felt that his family should be lifelong learners, as well. When the Army taught him techniques and practices that he felt would strengthen his immediate family, he brought those home and taught them to his siblings such as physical training and encounter groups where we sat in a “family circle” to resolve issues.

Spurred on by riding horses at Deacon Lorena Johnson Mills’ farm, Andrew developed a love for horses and horseback riding. He became an accomplished equestrian and made it possible for many of his family members to enjoy the sport as well. He became a collector of rare coins and firearms. In addition to collecting them, he restored them and became a certified firearms qualification instructor until his death.

This Man for All Seasons was deeply committed to improving the quality of life for people at every turn. Where there was injustice or discrimination, he offered “food for thought” in the form of advice and strategic support. His philanthropic interests ranged from strengthening economically challenged families in Virginia to becoming a Big Brother to numerous youth throughout his adult life. His community involvement included membership in the NAACP, leadership in the Blacks in Government organization, musical director for the Ft. Myers Gospel Choir,

dedication to the Hillside High School Class of 1965, volunteer election officer, and more community organizations than can be enumerated here. He was the founder of the MBNG Triad, a philanthropic organization created to support the community development non-profit, EmPOWERment Inc. in Chapel Hill, NC. The Triad has raised thousands of dollars in support of this organization headed by his sister, Delores Bailey. A highly sought after public speaker, seminar and workshop leader, Andrew delighted and inspired audiences with his humor, wit, wisdom, and penchant for singing. He was particularly fond of the hymns, *“Jesus is Real to Me”* and *“Just a Little Talk with Jesus.”* At his death, he was a long-time member of the Mount Salvation Baptist Church in Arlington, Virginia and ardent supporter of many ministries, including his “home” church, Barbee’s Chapel Harvest Word Church in Chapel Hill.

He was well-known for his appreciation of “fine dining.” For Donald that meant finding out who the “culinary angels” were in every community where he lived beginning in the Barbee’s Chapel community. As recently as November, 2016, he heralded the great cooks in the neighborhood in a speech honoring Veterans at Greater Cleggs Chapel Baptist Church in Timberlake, NC. He took several minutes listing his “culinary angels” by name and food specialty. More recently, he enjoyed the dishes prepared by “culinary angel”, Mrs. Pat Atkins (David), his neighbors in Alexandria.

Donald believed deeply in sharing the blessings given him and supporting the advancement of those around him, whenever possible. From his beloved Aunt, Verta Sue Jordan Howard and his mother, Lida Ruth Dickerson Malloy, he learned to share his home, his heart, and his wisdom with others. Consequently, he gathered to himself numerous “little brothers” and “play sons” notably Carmelo, Asbel, and Luis Escribano, Charles Vincent Swann, and Donald Wright.

Andrew is survived by his mother, Lida Dickerson Malloy, his siblings: Kenneth Malloy, Sr. (Vashti) [Master Sergeant, US Army-Retired], Nay Malloy Howell (John), Floretta Simmons (Lenwood), and Delores Bailey; His nieces and nephews: Stephen (Jen) and Simone Brackett, Christopher, Daniel, and Alexis Clarke, Kenneth Malloy, Jr., Jonathan (Tiffany), John William (Shanda), and Ava Howell, Ashley and Taylor Simmons, and Brinklee and Danielle Bailey; Brother-in-law: Carlos Clarke. Donald was preceded in death by his father, Elisha, and sisters: Ramona “Puddin” Clarke, and Ava Brackett. He is also survived by special cousins, Edna “Sugarfoot” Fowler, Brenda Crockett, Brandin Howard, Rosalyn Marshall (Lawrence), the Terence and Dee James Family, the Michael and Deidre Brice Family, his fiancé, Joyce Bowie, countless other “chosen family” members, and a host of friends.

As a man who deeply believed that “excellent relationships don’t happen by accident,” he has truly left an imprint on the hearts and in the families of all who held him dear. He made a positive difference wherever he went. May that truly be said of us all. Donald was a Man for All Seasons whose legacy still influences the seasons of countless lives. He worked tirelessly and thoughtfully to eradicate injustice, ignorance, bigotry, and discrimination. Now it is time for him to take his rest.

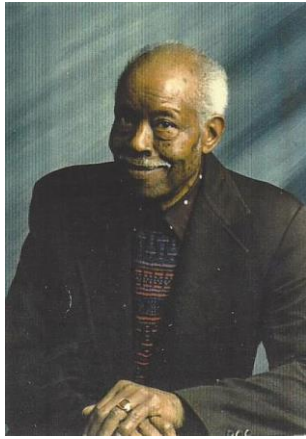

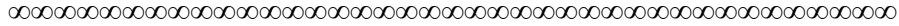

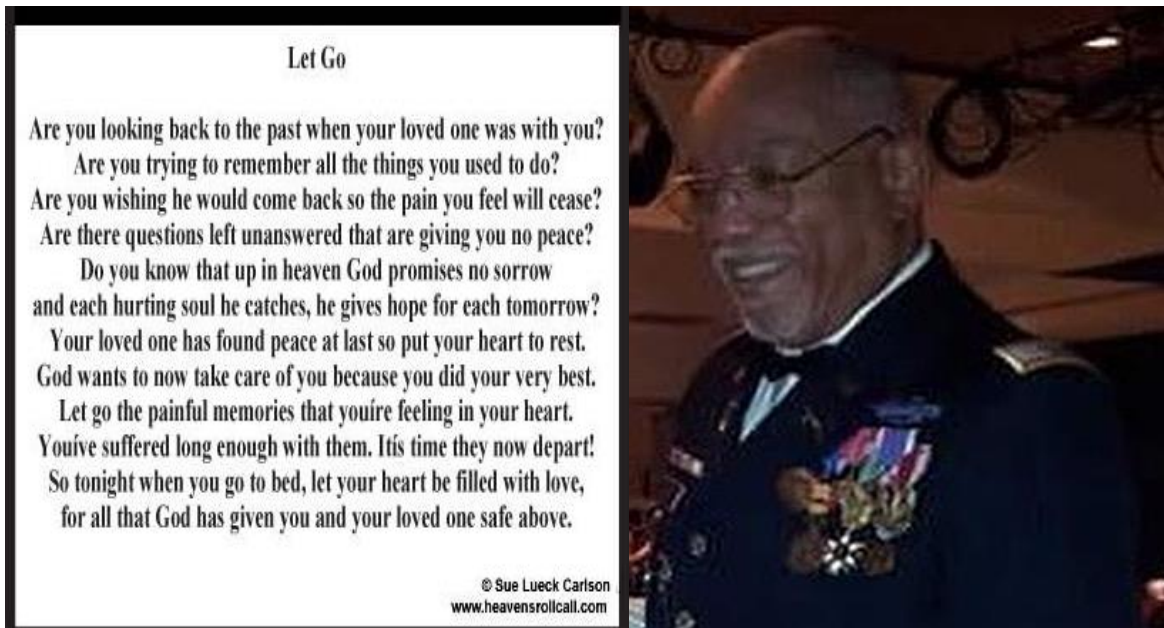
